





Guiding Principles

Address health disparities known to directly influence social inequities in health through programs that target populations with higher incidents of disease.

Address the root causes of homelessness, to include collaborative solutions for mental health, substance abuse and identifying pathways to independent living.

Bolster economic recovery for community members to mitigate financial hardships, implement structural changes, or address other COVID-related issues. **Enhance childhood environments** with key partners in the community who deliver early learning and family support services

Build stronger neighborhoods with initiatives that preserve and expand upon affordable housing options for low to mid-income level earners in our community.

Partnership with Nonprofits Organizations

- Opportunity to **pilot projects** and programs
- Address urgent needs without expanding county staffing levels
- Nonprofits provide services that **support prevention or diversion**
- Expand **community partnerships** and **cost-effective** collaboration
- Nonprofits are imbedded in the local community
- Allows for government agencies to **focus on core services**
- Build capacity for Nonprofit community to use Federal Funds




Community Grant Oversight (ARPA-SLFRF Funds)

- Compliance with Uniform Guidance 2 CFR 200 & ARPA Final Rule
- Required to have a signed Conflict of Interest Form
- CR performs a Subrecipient Risk Assessment + develops a Subrecipient Monitoring Strategy (desk reviews, site visits, and quarterly reporting)
- Required to have a signed Subgrant Agreement between County and Nonprofit organization
- All ARPA-funded projects are required to submit quarterly Activity Reports
- All nonprofit grants are on a cost-reimbursement basis
 - Monitoring for procurement standard compliance (necessary and reasonable)
 - Monitoring for alignment with scope of work (allocable costs)
- All nonprofit grants require quarterly project evaluation reports to understand program metrics and performance measures (outcomes & outputs)
- CR Staff is available for technical assistance and support.
