GENERAL INFORMATION



- Pyramid Highway (State Route 445) is the most heavily traveled road in the Reno-Sparks area and carries almost 50,000 vehicles per day
- Crash rates exceed statewide averages
- Local access and connectivity needs improvement
- There are minimal accommodations for pedestrians and bicyclists





- Corridor Study completed early 2000's
- Pyramid Highway US 395 Connection
- Final Environmental Impact Statement completed June 2018






GENERAL INFORMATION



PREFERRED ALTERNATIVE

- Widen Pyramid Way to 6 lanes south of Los Altos Parkway to Queen Way and improvements north of Los Altos Parkway to Golden View Drive (Phase 1)
- New 6 & 4 lane arterial US 395 Connector
- Interchange at US 395 Parr Boulevard/ Dandini Boulevard
- Widen Pyramid Way to 6 lanes north of the Connector to Eagle Canyon Drive/La Posada Drive
- Widen Disc Drive from Pyramid Way to Vista Boulevard
- Provide pedestrian, bicycle and transit amenities








PHASE 1

- Widen 1.6 miles from Queen Way to Los Altos Parkway from four to six lanes
- Reconstruct 0.75 miles of four-lane roadway from Los Altos Parkway to Golden View Drive
- Install smart traffic signals, bicycle lanes, sidewalk, shared-use path, screening/sound walls and enhanced drainage infrastructure










QUEEN WAY TO LOS ALTOS PARKWAY

Proposed Improvements












LOS ALTOS PARKWAY TO GOLDEN VIEW DRIVE

The tufa (too-fuh) rocks of Anaho Island provide a


sanctuary for many species of waterfowl including


American White Pelican nesting. Below the lake's surface

pelicans.



PHASE 1 COST INFORMATION

- \$54.1 million budget
- \$23 million federal BUILD grant
- Other federal, state, and local funds
- Cost includes right-of-way and construction
