
Mational APPRENTICESHIP WEEK

NOVEMBER 15-21, 2021









The U.S. Department of Labor has designated November 15-21, 2021 as National Apprenticeship Week, the 7-year anniversary of the event. The North American Building Trades Unions and its signatory contractors have funded and operated a skilled craft apprenticeship system for over 100 years.

To celebrate this event, the apprenticeship programs of select Northern Nevada Building and Construction Trades unions and their associated contractors once again invite elected officials, along with business and industry personnel, to visit their joint apprenticeship training centers to see what the centers have to offer – and why apprenticeship has earned the name "the other four-year degree."

Building Trades apprenticeship programs lead the way in training for the advanced construction skills necessary to draw cutting-edge technology companies to our state — and many have been assessed for college credit and are accredited through TMCC. Apprentices earn a certificate that may be applied toward an associates or bachelor's degree. Some apprenticeship programs even offer associates' degrees to their graduates. And just this month, Washoe County School District signed an MOU to work towards implementing the Multi-Craft Core Curriculum, an award-winning national standard for pre-apprenticeship training. Nearly 9 out of 10 apprentices are employed after finishing their apprenticeship.

Registered apprenticeships expand opportunities in our workforce for individuals who have been historically underserved, marginalized, and adversely affected by persistent poverty and inequality. They provide a path for all qualified people, including women, youth, people of color, rural communities, the formerly incarcerated, and people with disabilities to become apprentices and contribute to America's industries.


Apprenticeship is an "earn while you learn" system that offers people of all ages the chance to learn from construction industry professionals. Graduating apprentices obtain a portable, nationally recognized credential that they can take anywhere in the country. Building & Construction Trades apprentices average a starting wage of \$15 to \$21 per hour and workers will earn an average of \$300,000 more over their lifetime than their non-apprentice peers.

There are currently 92 registered apprenticeship programs in Nevada, training 6,048 registered apprentices. Most construction trades journeymen retire between the ages of 55 to 62. In the next 10 years, we may lose half of our skilled, trained workforce, making training more critical than ever. Additionally, as construction has been deemed an essential industry in Nevada, advanced construction jobs have helped keep local economies thriving during the pandemic.

Apprenticeship reduces turnover costs and increase employee retention. Per the US Department of Labor, for every dollar spent on apprenticeship, employers get approximately \$1.50 in ROI. We invite you to join us at our joint apprenticeship training facilities to learn more about "the other four-year degree" and what apprenticeships can do for our community.



APPRENTICESHIP CONTINUES TO DEMONSTRATE STRONG GROWTH



*The COVID-19 pandemic's affect on the national economy resulted in a 12% decline in the number of new apprentices in FY 2020 compared to FY 2019. Even with this decline, FY 2020 numbers are the third-highest ever for the Registered Apprenticeship program.

Northern Nevada's trade unions offer paid apprenticeships with great wages and benefits, free high-tech training, and a clear career path. Apprenticeships range from 2.5 to 5 years. You'll earn above-average wages **starting day one** while you learn from the masters - in the classroom and on the job.

Apprenticeships in the union building and construction trades are one of the only fields that pays YOU to go to college. That = \$0 student debt!

Apprentice wages start between \$14-20+/hr and rise at regular intervals. Most apprentices graduate making \$25-40+/hr and it goes up fast from there! Each apprenticeship program has its own application period and some have waiting lists. Applying is free and easy – we suggest applying to your top 3 favorites.

Over the course of one of our apprenticeship programs, the average apprentice earns \$200,000 to \$300,000.

All of our apprentices earn FREE credits at an accredited community college just for being in the apprenticeship program. Some programs offer an associates' degree upon graduation.

The union building and construction trades offer free state-of-the-art training on new processes, equipment, and technology for the duration of your union career.

After graduation, apprentices go on to become journeymen, foremen, site & project managers, superintendents, instructors, and small business owners.

Don't let the outdated titles fool you - these jobs are for women, too! Union jobs offer equal pay and paid leave. We need more of you on the job!

WHAT ARE THE BUILDING TRADES?

- Bricklayers: Bricklayers build a variety of structures, including floors, walls, chimneys
 and partitions out of brick, concrete block and other masonry materials.
- Construction Craft Laborers: Laborers work many roles on construction projects, such as flagging, material handling, demolition, excavation, pipe laying & concrete cutting.
- Electricians: Electricians plan, install, and maintain electrical systems, installing wiring and other components like breaker boxes, switches, lighting, data and video cabling.
- Heat & Frost Insulators: Insulators apply insulation and protective finishes on high & low-temperature surfaces. Typical job sites are hospitals, power plants, and schools.
- Iron Workers: Ironworkers install and move large girders, beams, rebar, and other
 materials in bridges and buildings, on elevators, stairways, and balconies, and reinforce
 concrete in walls and roads.
- NV Energy Apprenticeships: These apprenticeships include customer service, electricians, linemen, fitters & welders, gas pressure operators, and meter technicians.
- Operating Engineers: Operating engineers operate and maintain heavy equipment like dozers, cranes, motor graders, loaders, pavers, and mixers.
- Painters & Allied Trades: These pros include painters, drywall finishers, wall & floor coverers, glaziers, glass workers, sign makers, and display workers.
- Plasterers & Cement Masons: Plasterers apply exterior & interior coating materials to building surfaces. Cement masons install curbs, gutters, slab driveways, and sidewalks.
- Plumbers & Pipefitters: Plumbers install and maintain plumbing and drainage systems, while pipefitters install piping to convey air, gas, or liquids. HVAC techs work on heating & cooling systems.
- Sheet Metal Workers: These craftspeople fabricate & install sheet metal for use in heating, cooling, ventilation, ductwork, skylights, and metal roofing and siding.

Bricklayers - Bricklayers build a variety of structures, including floors, walls, chimneys and partitions out of brick, concrete block and other masonry materials. Apprentices start at \$22.07/hr. Journey Level \$34.82*/hr.



Construction Craft Laborers - Construction Craft Laborers work on roads, buildings, and pipelines. We place concrete, lay pipe, and rake asphalt. Apprentices start at \$15.37/hr. Journey Level \$25.45*/hr.



Electricians - Electricians plan, install, and maintain electrical systems for structures and other electrical components. Apprentices \$15.80*/hr, Journey Level more than \$39.50*/hr.



Heat & Frost Insulators - Insulators apply insulation and protective finishes on high and low temperature surfaces. Apprentice \$16.08*/hr, Journey Level more than \$40.21*/hr.



Ironworkers - There are several different types of ironworkers, such as Structural Ironworkers or Ornamental Ironworkers. Apprentice \$18.00*/hr, Journey Level \$36.00*/hr.



NV Energy - (Employer Sponsored) - NV Energy offers several Nevada State Apprenticeship (NASC) programs. Apprentice \$31.00*/hr, Journey Level from \$47.00*/hr.



Operating Engineers - Operating Engineers operate and maintain various types of equipment, such as cranes, dozers, and loaders. Apprentice at least \$19.86*/hr, Journey Level \$25.00*-\$45.00*/hr.



Painters & Allied Trades - Along with painters, this trade contains drywall finishers, wall coverers, floor covering installers, and more. Drywall Apprentice \$15.34*/hr, Journey \$30.67*/hr. Floor Covering Apprentice \$14.15*/hr, Journey \$28.30*/hr. Painters Apprentice \$13.64*/hr, Journey \$24.80*/hr.



Plasterers & Cement Masons - Plasterers apply and finish exterior and interior coat materials. Cement Masons install curbs, gutters, and more. Plaster Apprentice more than \$19.61*/hr, Journey more than \$27.94*/hr. Cement Mason Apprentice more than \$16.26*/hr, Journey more than \$28.96*/hr.



Plumbers & Pipefitters - Plumbers & pipefitters install, service, and repair a variety of residential and commercial projects. Apprentice begins at \$21.00*/hr, Journey \$32.00*-\$42.50*/hr.



Sheet Metal Workers - Sheet Metal Workers fabricate, install, service, and inspect sheet metal items for a variety of applications. Apprentices \$14.00*/hr, Journey \$32.00*-\$42.50*/hr.
