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Chief's Report

History and Current Status

The history of the Medical Examiner's Office can be described in two eras: pre-2007 and post-2007. Prior to 2007, the office was the Washoe County Coroner Office (WCCO) and was managed by a layperson coroner. Pathologists were retained on a contract basis to perform autopsies, and frequently also actively practiced hospital pathology at the same time. Effective July 1, 2007, the Board of County Commissioners approved county code changes that established a Medical Examiner system in Washoe County, and the office became known as the Washoe County Medical Examiner-Coroner Office. A forensic pathologist was appointed as the Chief Medical Examiner and Coroner and employed a second forensic pathologist as a full-time Assistant Medical Examiner; numerous part-time locum tenens pathologists from across the country were added over time to handle the increasing regional caseload. A Deputy Chief Medical Examiner was recruited in 2015 due to both caseload and the need for succession planning. Dr. Ellen Clark was the first Chief Medical Examiner of the office and retired at the end of 2016 after many years of dedicated service.

The office relocated in January 2017 from 10 Kirman Avenue to the current site: 990 East 9th Street, a modern, state-of-the-art facility, newly constructed in 2016. The agency rebranded at this time as the Washoe County Regional Medical Examiner's Office (WCRMEO).

Dr. Laura Knight, previously Deputy Chief Medical Examiner from 2015-2016, became Chief Medical Examiner and Coroner in January 2017 and remains in that position. Three Assistant Medical Examiners completed the physician staff of the office up until April 2023, when a Deputy Chief Medical Examiner was recruited. All five forensic pathologists employed by the WCRMEO are board-certified by the American Board of Pathology in Forensic Pathology.

Total deaths reported to WCRMEO in 2023 were 5,907, down slightly from 6,206 in 2022 and from the all-time high of 6,321 in 2021. This includes Washoe County deaths and all outside referral counties. However, more of the deaths reported in 2023 were jurisdictional cases requiring examination than in previous years. In 2023, WCRMEO pathologists performed 1,019 autopsies (a record high); 323 medical external examinations; and 783 consultations (medical records review and death certificate completion) (also a record high). Annual number of autopsies has steadily increased over the years, up 72% since 2015. Total deaths reported increased 55% over the same time period, indicating that a greater percentage of deaths reported are non-natural deaths that fall under Medical Examiner jurisdiction. Much of the increase has been fueled by drug-related deaths, as will be apparent in the data later in this report; drug-related deaths reached an unfortunate all-time high in our region in 2023.

The WCRMEO played a significant role in public health surveillance during the COVID-19 pandemic, collecting the first swab from a deceased individual to screen for COVID-19 on March 6, 2020. WCRMEO collected nasopharyngeal and other swabs for COVID-19 (SARS-CoV-2) testing in 273 deceased individuals in 2021, with 98 positive results; 156 deceased individuals in 2022; and 54 deceased individuals in 2023 with only 10 positive results. All deaths reported to the office during the pandemic time period were historically screened for COVID-19 symptoms. All

cases certified as being due to COVID-19 had a confirmed positive laboratory test for SARS-CoV2.

The WCRMEO continued to receive grant funding in 2023 from the CDC (through the state) for data entry into the National Violent Death Reporting System (NVDRS) and for toxicology testing and related expenses from the SUDORS grant. Data entry through these programs is utilized for state and national level death prevention efforts.

Finally in 2023, the office successfully leveraged new technological advances in forensic genetic genealogy (FGG) to identify individuals whose remains were in such poor condition due to decomposition that they could not be identified when found. Some such cases date back to the late 1970s to early 1980s. Prioritizing homicide (or suspected homicide) cold cases first, the office sent a total of nine cases for FGG analysis and achieved one of hopefully many such identifications in 2023. The identity of the deceased may allow additional investigative leads in the investigation of who may have been involved in her death. More importantly, we were able to restore the dignity of being laid to rest with her name and provide some closure to her surviving family members.

Continuing Excellence and Future Goals

Future goals and priorities of the office include national accreditation by the National Association of Medical Examiners (anticipated for 2025); continuing partnerships with organ and tissue donation organizations; mass fatality preparedness; and academic partnership with the University. We will continue to be the regional referral center for high quality autopsies, providing services on a contract basis to 18 additional counties in Nevada and Northern California, and the regional center for excellence in medicolegal death investigation. We will continue to conduct high quality mass fatality training exercises, and training conferences on medicolegal death investigation for surrounding county coroners and law enforcement. We will enhance the education of medical students, through cooperation with the University of Nevada-Reno School of Medicine, hopefully recruiting future forensic pathologists to the field to combat what has become a dire workforce shortage. Finally, and most importantly, we will strive to continue to serve the citizens of Washoe County with diligence, respect, and compassion, at a time when many of them are having the worst day of their lives, having lost a loved one.

Final Words

This report represents the 8th annual statistical and informational report of the Washoe County Regional Medical Examiner's Office. It is my sincere hope that other regional agencies, community leaders, law enforcement, county coroners, and citizens may find it interesting and useful, and that it may inform regional policy. Additionally, I hope this data may be of use in prevention efforts, as many of the deaths that come to the attention of the Medical Examiner/Coroner are ultimately preventable.



Mission Statement

The mission of the Washoe County Regional Medical Examiner's Office (WCRMEO) is to investigate unexpected and unexplained deaths in order to identify and report on the cause and manner of death. We apply scientific investigative techniques and medical procedures, with integrity and compassion, to serve families and public agencies impacted by sudden unexpected death.

Statutory Authority

The WCRMEO is primarily governed by Chapter 259, 440, and 451 of the Nevada Revised Statutes (NRS) and Chapter 35 of the Washoe County Code (WCC). NRS 259 requires that each county have a coroner and WCC 35 creates the Medical Examiner system to fulfill coroner duties.

Description

The Medical Examiner investigates sudden or unexpected deaths, traumatic deaths, and suspicious deaths. Certain categories of sudden death, by law, must be reported to and investigated by this office. All suspicious and many apparent natural death scenes in Washoe County are attended and evaluated by trained Medicolegal Death Investigators employed by the Medical Examiner's Office. Many reported deaths are ultimately determined to be due to natural causes, but a significant number of reported cases are found to be due to accidents, homicidal trauma, and suicides. Of the deaths reported to and falling within the office's jurisdiction in 2022 (not including deaths referred from outside counties on a contractual basis), 61% required autopsy or other medical examination and an additional 39% required detailed review of medical history and circumstances of death. Board-certified forensic pathologists (medical doctors specializing in forensic pathology) conduct these autopsy and medical examinations.

Responsibilities of the office include:

- O Determining the cause and manner of death for jurisdictional cases
- Electronic certification of death certificates in all cases of unnatural death and in many cases of natural death
- Conducting investigations of death scenes
- Identifying, collecting and processing evidence in order to ensure scientific integrity and usefulness
- o Recognizing unsuspected homicidal violence
- Recognizing and reporting communicable and dangerous diseases, poisonings, and consumer product safety concerns
- o Positively identifying the dead
- Notifying the decedent's next of kin and providing proper assistance to grieving families
- o Ensuring integrity of the personal property of decedents
- o Providing expert legal testimony in criminal and civil matters
- Preparing for and responding to mass disasters
- o Assisting in providing for burial of indigent citizens in accordance with law

Community and Academic Involvement

The WCRMEO is very active in the community. In 2023, WCRMEO staff made many presentations in the community including the Nevada Law Enforcement Academy, Nevada Department of Public Safety, the Peer Support Group, high school students, and lectures to medical students at the University of Nevada, Reno (UNR). The office also hosts a two-day educational conference on death scene investigation for law enforcement/coroner agencies in the region. Dr. Knight also was an invited speaker for a national webinar in February 2023 for Project ECHO: OD-FIT, titled: "Tips & Tricks for Building a Resilient Medicolegal Death Investigators' Workforce".

Pathologists in the office have a letter of appointment to teach at the University of Nevada, Reno with a rank of Assistant or Associate Professor. WCRMEO hosted educational rotations in-office for dozens of UNR medical students, as well as law enforcement officers, and other students in related fields.

In 2023, a total of ten scientific abstracts were presented at national scientific conferences involving collaboration with WCRMEO, with principal authors or coauthors from the office; these conferences were the Annual Scientific Meeting of the National Association of Medical Examiners (NAME), the American Academy of Forensic Sciences (AAFS), and the International Association of Medical Examiners and Coroners (IACME). These presentations represent collaborations with UNR Anthropology faculty, students and faculty of UNR School of Medicine, UNR undergraduate students, and Medical Examiners and researchers from other academic institutions outside of Nevada. Topics included complex suicides in NV, vaping-related mortality, peer support and wellness programs in Medical Examiner offices, and Medical Examiner collaboration with organ and tissue donation. Additionally, the *American Journal of Forensic Medicine and Pathology* published an original research article from WCRMEO in September 2023, co-authored by two UNR medical students with Dr. Knight as the senior author, titled: Hemorrhage: Fact or Artifact? A Retrospective Analysis of Patterns of Postmortem Anterior Neck Muscle Hemorrhages from Hypostasis vs. Strangulation".

WCRMEO Staff regularly participate in fatality review committees and other prevention efforts in our state, including the NV State Committee to Review Suicide Fatalities (of which Dr. Knight is the Chairperson), NV State Maternal Mortality Review Committee, Washoe County Child Fatality Review Team, regional

Substance Abuse Task Force, CDC NV Advanced Review Team for the Sudden Death in the Young project, and hospital-based peer review committees. Dr. Knight also served as Chair of the State Disaster Identification Coordination Committee. The WCRMEO continued to receive grant funding in 2023 from the CDC (through the state) for data entry into the National Violent Death Reporting System (NVDRS) and for toxicology testing and related expenses from the Overdose Data to Action (OD2A) grant. Data entry through these programs is utilized for state and national level death prevention efforts.

Awards and Honors

In 2023, the Washoe County Regional Medical Examiner's Office received the following awards:

- Dr. Laura Knight was honored to receive the 2023 Governor's Award, presented by Nevada Donor Network and Governor Joe Lombardo in Carson City, NV, "for outstanding efforts in supporting the gift of life through organ and tissue donation".
- Dr. Knight wishes to acknowledge her gratitude for the critical role of the staff of the WCRMEO in earning these recognitions.

Jurisdiction and Service Area

The WCRMEO's primary jurisdiction is Washoe County. However, the office provides services to 13 additional Nevada counties (including the state capital) and 6 California counties through interlocal agreements.



Examination Types and Descriptions

Autopsy

A full postmortem examination encompassing detailed examination of the exterior and interior of the body, including dissection of internal organs and structures, to determine cause of death. Specimens for additional studies, such as toxicology testing, are obtained during the autopsy.

Limited Autopsy-Head Only An autopsy examination limited to the external examination of the entire body and internal examination of only the head. Used in select trauma or suspected trauma cases only. Toxicology specimens can be obtained during a limited autopsy.

External Examination

An examination of the exterior of the body that documents identifying features, stigmata of disease, and findings of injury, without accompanying internal dissection. Toxicology specimens such as blood can be obtained during an external examination.

Consultation

Death investigated by the WCRMEO in which no physical examination is performed because the decedent has well-documented medical condition(s) and no primary care physician, or trauma with prolonged hospitalization, determined to be the cause of death. A Medical Examiner reviews medical records and circumstances of death and completes the death certificate.

Jurisdiction Terminated

Natural death from known natural disease that is reported to the WCRMEO but does not fall within its jurisdiction

Manner of Death Types and Descriptions

Natural Death caused by a natural disease or medical condition

Suicide Death caused by a purposeful self-action with the intent of ending

one's own life

Homicide Death at the hands of another

Accident Death caused by an unintentional action or external factor

Death in which the cause of death may or may not be known, but the

Undetermined circumstances in which the death came about are unknown or







Total ME Jurisdictional Cases* by Age





Total Examination Cases* by Age




Total Reported Deaths by Day of the Week



Total Reported Deaths by Time of Death




Total Reported Deaths by Month



Washoe County Drug Intoxication Deaths

2023 saw the mega-trend of increases in drug intoxication deaths continue, reaching a record high of 358 deaths, up 76% over the 5-year period since 2019, and nearly tripled since 2012. Over half of the 2023 illicit drug-related deaths involved methamphetamine, and over half involved fentanyl, which was usually present in combination with other drugs.





Washoe County Unhoused Person Deaths

Deaths of unhoused individuals (persons with no fixed address or living quarters) reported to the WCRMEO are specifically tracked in the WCRMEO case database. There were 135 deaths in 2023, which is an increase from 99 in 2022, 57 in 2021, and 49 in 2020. The vast majority of these deaths were accidental in nature (most often from drug toxicity, as also seen in the general population), distantly followed by natural disease.

Other Statistics of Interest+

- In 2023, 94% of autopsy/examination reports were finalized within 60 days; 99% were finalized within 90 days.
- 42 organ, 193 tissue, and 311 ocular donations were performed on Medical Examiner cases in 2023, with the full cooperation of the WCRMEO.
- There were 195 unclaimed and abandoned decedents reported to the WCRMEO in 2023.
- There was 1 death in Washoe County in which a decedent remained unidentified after thorough investigation in 2023. There was 1 case in 2022, 1 in 2021, none in 2020, 1 in 2019, 1 in 2018, and none in both 2017 and 2016.
- 1,606 bodies were transported to and stored at the Medical Examiner's Office in 2023. 1,782 bodies in 2022, 1,881 in 2021, 1,672 in 2020, 1,512 in 2019, 1,495 in 2018, 1,463 in 2017 and 1,320 in 2016.
- A total of 2,126 bodies were transported on the order of the WCRMEO in 2023.
- Toxicology testing was performed on 1,396 cases in 2023. 1,390 cases in 2022, 1,235 in 2021, 1,206 in 2020, 1,076 in 2019, 1,022 in 2018, 956 in 2017, and 809 in 2016.
- The WCRMEO participated in 0 exhumations in 2023.
