Audrey Keller founder and CEO of Dolphin Data Corp. (1990-2005), a Southern California-based database marketing and direct mail company focused on national and institutional accounts. Dolphin Data was on the annual list of the "Top 100 Women-Owned Businesses" compiled by the *Los Angeles Business* 

Journal. Her clients included the University of Southern California, General

Electric, CKE Restaurants (Carl's Jr.), and the Archdiocese of Los Angeles.

In 2006, Ms. Keller received the "Women in Business Champion of the Year" award from the Small Business Administration. She also received a Congressional commendation for "outstanding and invaluable service to the community." She served the National Association of Women Business Owners / Los Angeles in leadership capacities for over a decade, including as its Chair (2007) and President (2006). NAWBO-LA is one of the largest chapters of this organization in the US and represents the interests of more than 300,000 woman-owned businesses in Southern California.

After selling her firm to a national company, Audrey and her family moved to Ventura County where she developed a new passion in championing environmental and community efforts. Audrey was the founding Chairperson of the Channel Islands Neighborhood Council - CINC in 2018, representing 5,000 residents on the harbor for the City of Oxnard. Key responsibilities included advocating for the residents of the Channel Islands Harbor at the State, County and City levels. Audrey's community volunteer work ethic led her to serve a five-year Chair of Audit for PCYC – a private yacht club and public marina.

Currently Audrey serves the County of Ventura's Harbor Visioning Committee for the commercial and public spaces development 2023 as one of the largest harbors in the State of California. The County Board of Supervisors and the County CEO approved the Harbor Visioning Plan as a core guiding document in June 2021 and recognized Audrey's work and leadership in 2022, before the family relocated to Reno, Nevada.

Continuing on a leadership path in Reno, 2023 Audrey has been a high-profile community activist against developer demolition of the famous Rancharrah Equestrian Center. Independent development consulting work in California continues with an international firm launching a new project in a Ventura County harbor, bringing one million visitors annually.
