
## Who are Junior Rangers?

- They are the next generation of park protectors, advocates and stewards. Perhaps even the future of the Parks team...




## **Junior Ranger Activity Guide**


- Re-imagined in 2023 as a collaborative effort by Washoe County's Park Rangers and Digital Communications.






























#### Who Lives Here?

Biomes are zones where a particular kind of environment exists, such as deserts, forests, and wetlands. The relationship between plants and animals has a lot to do with what type of environment they are in. Herbivores (prey animals) that depend on a certain type of plant for survival may only be found where that plant exists, while carnivores (predatory animals) might roam between one or more biomes as they hunt for their food. Can you tell who lives here by looking at their tracks? Draw a line between the animal and their tracks, and then draw a second line to connect them to their biome. Hint: There may be more than one possible biome depending on the animal!









#### Bowers Mansion Park Page Text


Did you know? Sandy and his wife Eilley built the Bowers Mansion in 1864 after becoming Nevadá's first Comstock Lode Millionaires. They earned a fortune with their silver mine near Gold Hill, Nevada. After becoming a Washoe County Park in 1946, the mansion was restored in the 1960's to become one of the most impressive examples of Nevada history. You can take a guided tour of the mansion, which is open seasonally each year! Can you find your way through the Mansion Maze?


